- 5. At the time of the story, is Cheri an adult?
 - a. Or one could ask, is Cheri more than a spoiled brat?
- 6. What is it about Cheri that makes him irresistible to Lea?
- 7. There are elements of quasi-maternal love and pure sexual passion in Lea's and Cheri's relationship. Does one or the other predominate?
- 8. How does the age difference affect the power balance in the relationship?
- 9. Interior décor and bedroom appointments are richly described. How might this be important?
- 10. Why did Charlotte (Cheri's mother) condone Cheri's liaison with Lea?
 - a. How would you describe Lea's and Charlotte's relationship?
- 11. Why is Cheri unhappy with his wife?
- 12. Why is he finally able to leave Lea and return to Edmee?
- 13. Was Lea going to be able to "make it on her own" after losing Cheri?
- 14. Did Colette intend this story to be ironic in any way?
- 15. Is this "Proust Lite"?
